Brace of Chester doubles for MHS

ABRACE of Chester doubles were amongst the highlights of a hugely productive September for Manor House Stables.

The victories of course specialists Box To Box and Roman Dragon on September 16 and Prince Of Zenda and Reel Rosie a fortnight later were amongst 13 for the yard over the course of the month.

Box To Box's victory in the 1m2½f Camden Hells Handicap was his second of the year at the course, where he also won twice in 2022, and earned his owners, the Running Order Partnership, more than £22,000.

With David Probert in the saddle, the four-year-old dominated from the moment the stalls opened, keeping on well in the closing stages to come home one and a quarter lengths to the good over favourite First Impression.



Box To Box's jubilant connections

Roman Dragon was also scoring for the second time this season on the Roodee when he took the penultimate race on the same card to chalk up a fifth course victory.

With the Heeraat gelding drawn six of seven, Hayley Turner was forced to plot a wide course throughout but Roman Dragon hit the front in the final furlong and had one and a half lengths to spare over Glorious Angel at the line.

Roman Dragon has now been suc-

cessful in five of his 24 starts and won in excess of £60,000.

Prince Of Zenda romped to a 12-length victory in the 7½f novice stakes on last Saturday's Chester card. Again, Hayley was in the saddle, as Middleham Park Racing's three-year-old gelding recorded a first career victory at the sixth attempt.

And stable and jockey made it a double on the day when 25-1 outsider Reel Rosie took the 1m2½f fillies' handicap. It was a first victory for the Real Wheel[1] ers and Dealers four-year-old filly since moving to MHS in early June.

The victories of Roman Dragon, Box To Box, Prince Of Zenda, and Reel Rosie saw Hugo move clear of Andrew Balding in the battle to be Chester's top trainer in 2023. With just one meeting to go, Hugo now has 10 winners to the Kingsclere trainer's eight.

L'Astronome begins well

EXCITING French import L'Astronome, inset, ran a race full of promise when making his debut for MHS at Chester last month.

Al Asayl Bloodstock's four-year-old returned to something like his best when finishing third in the Listed tote Stand Cup Stakes over 1m4½f on September 16.

Previously trained by Francis
Henri
Graffard in France, the son of Frankel won his first two races in 2022, before taking the Group 2 Prix Prix Hocquart at Longchamp.

L'Astronome's form dipped somewhat after that, prompting a change of stable in the hope that he may prefer the tranquility of MHS to the hustle and bustle of Chantilly. And while it remains early days, his Chester run is a cause for considerable optimism.

MHS passes its 2022 total

WITH 13 winners in September, Manor House sailed past its total for the whole of last year.

As of October 1, MHS had amassed 46 domestic winners, as well as two overseas, compared to 43 in the UK and one each in Germany and Ireland in 2022.

And the yard's rich vein of form has continued into October, with three more winners taking it onto 51 for the year.

He's A Gentleman scored at Wolverhampton on Wednesday, just 24 hours before Master Franca and Military Tycoon took races at Lingfield and Salisbury respectively.

IN addition to doubles at New-castle on September 8 and Chester on September 16 and 30, Manor House enjoyed a further seven winners during the course of September.

The three-year-old Eloped recorded her first victory for owners johnpaulrickmike when scoring with consummate ease, under up-and-coming 3lb claimer Taylor Fisher, in a 1m4f Wolverhampton handicap on September 9.

Less than 24 hours after Eloped had provided Hugo with his third winner of the month, OG Beachwear added to that total when scoring at Catterick.

The three-year-old filly, who is owned by Michael Owen and takes her name from his daughter Gemma's beachwear brand. produced a career-best perfor-

mance to break her maiden in a 6f novice stakes at Catterick, under Jason Hart.

Navarre Express was another first-time scorer when landing a 1m4f Ffos Las handicap for owners Hunscote Stud and Lynne Maclennan on September 14. Ross Coakley was aboard the three-year-old Roaring Lion filly.

The yard's sixth winner of a productive month came the very next day when James Doyle guided Al Asayal Bloodstock's exciting two-year-old Under The Sun to a bloodless success in a 1m novice stakes at Salisbury.

Two of the yard's next three September winners sported the familiar black and green silks of long-standing MHS owner Derek Passant.

Derek's three-year-old filly Victoria Falls bagged her third race this year, under Connor Planas, in a 1m handicap at Thirsk on September 18, while Oisin Murphy was aboard Monkmoor Pip as the three-year-old newcomer took a 1m Lingfield maiden eight days later.

In between those two victories, Richard Kingscote partnered the Middleham Park Racing four-year-old How Impressive to victory in a 6f Yarmouth handicap on September

Gunfighter gives Hugo a double

IN addition to a brace of doubles at Chester last month (see Page One). MHS was also responsible for two winners at Newcastle's all-weather fixture on Friday, September 8.

Fleur De Mer set the ball rolling when successful in the second race on the card, a 1m2f handicap, and Gunfighter made it a double for Hugo when scoring in the sixth race, a 6f novice stakes.

Fleur De Mer was winning for the second time in three races. for Al Asayal Bloodstock, having broken her maiden at Wolverhampton in July.

On this occasion, the threeyear-old filly was ridden by Jason Hart, who sent the daughter of Dark Angel on inside the final furlong, passing the post a length and a half to the good over her nearest pursuer in the 13-runner

Fleur De Mer again ran well when finishing third in a 1m3f handicap at Kempton on Wednesday evening.



Jason was also aboard Gunfighter as he scored in the red and black silks of Michael Blencowe. The juvenile colt travelled well throughout the six-furlong contest, but edged left inside the final furlong and had just a neck to spare over runner-up Pianoforte as the two horses flashed past the line together.

The victory was the first for

the son of Siyouni, who had looked like a surefire future winner when finishing third in an above-average Newbury maiden on his racecourse debut.

It was the second time this season Michael has tasted success at Gosforth Park, with Imperial Ace, who he owned in partnership with John O'Connor, scoring at the track in January.

I'm delighted we've already improved on 2022 campaign

I'M delighted that with almost three months of 2023 remaining we've already bettered last year's totals for both winners and prize money.

The victory of Military Tycoon at Salisbury on Thursday, inset, was our 51st of the year and took our earnings to more than £1,174,000.

The horses have been absolutely flying over the past few weeks, with 13 wins in September and three more already this month.

We had an awful lot of seconds over the summer. However, as, the greatest trainer of them all, Henry Cecil, liked to say: "Winners become seconds and seconds become winners."

Certainly, I thought we were due a change of luck although, you never know, I thought the same thing at a similar time last year but the horses didn't really pick up until November and December.

They've continued to run pretty well since then and I don't think they've ever been sick. However, we made a few little tweaks to our bio-security measures and infection management and it seems to be paying dividends.



As you'd imagine, I'm thrilled to have 50 winners on the board already and, while I'm loathe to set a target for the remainder of the year, if we could get to 60 that would have a nice ring

It won't be easy – every time we run a horse now we're thinking whether that might be it for the year - but we'll have a small team for the all-weather and it would be great if we could

ONE horse we definitely won't be seeing again this year is Under The Son, who broke his maiden at Salisbury last month and has now been put away for next season.

Al Asayl Bloodstock's two-year-old is a horse I've always liked and I'm hoping he will make

up into a good horse - I think he could have an exciting future ahead of him.

Likewise, Saviour, a well-bred son of Woottoon Bassett, did plenty wrong on his debut at Salisbury on Thursday but still managed to finish a decent third and could be another horse to look forward to in 2024.

And if I were to put forward an older horse, to follow, I was delighted with L'Astronome's first run for us when finishing third at Chester last month and could see him being campaigned internationally.

I THOROUGHLY enjoyed catching up with a number of familiar faces at the MHS Golf Day and am very much looking forward to doing so again when we host our annual yearling parade on Sunday, October 15.

I'm delighted with the horses we've bought so far - Michael has been very bold in the sale ring and we've secured some lovely types, one or two of whom are still available for purchase.. That said, we'll probably be parading more who've already been snapped up in order to give their owners the opportunity to see them for the first time.

Regardless of whether or not you're in the market to buy another horse, the bottom line is that the day promises to be great fun and we'd be delighted if you were to join us!
