Dragon slays his rivals in Bahrain

OMAN Dragon bagged the biggest pot of his career when winning in Bahrain last Friday.

Having disappointed on his first two starts in the Middle East, the five-yearold sprinter returned to form with a vengeance to land The Hawar Cup and earn his delighted owners, Nick Hughes and Michael Owen, almost £40,000 in prize money.

Ridden by Ebrahim Nader, Roman Dragon came with a powerful late run in the 6f handicap to beat John and Sean Quinn's Brazen Bolt by half a length.

Up until Friday, all five of Roman Dragon's career victories had come at

Chester; moreover, the son of Heeraat had failed to fire on his first two outings in the Bahrain Turf Series. However. connections elected to roll the dice one more time and were rewarded handsomely for their perseverance.

"We're absolutely delighted. He has got speed to burn but we often think he's better round a turning track than a straight track, so today is a lovely surprise," said Michael after the race.

"We thought beforehand Box To Box [unplaced earlier in the day] would be in the first three and this horse [Roman] Dragon] would be in the last three, but it happened the other way round!

"It's my first time here and I am really enjoying it. My old boss, Sir Alex Ferguson, was stood here not so long ago having won the big race, the Bahrain International Trophy, so it's clearly a lucky spot."

Top sprinter **Brad** retired

BRAD The Brief has been retired after winning eight of his 26 races and more than £170,000 in prize

Andrew Black's homebred sprinter, who scored on his racecourse debut at Bath in 2019, won the Group 3 Prix de Seine-et-Oise at Chantilly in 2020 and the Group 2 Greenland Stakes at the Curragh

in 2022. "Brad enjoyed a fantastic career but his time had come," reflected Hugo.

"He's a sweet horse - an absolute saint. It's only a shame that he didn't win for us last year and have the opportunity to bow out on a high."

While MHS has bid a fond farewell to Brad The Brief, Hugo sent out Andrew's Camelot filly, Kitteridge, to finish second on her first start in a Chelmsford novice stakes last month.

STENTON Glider performed with credit on her first start in Dubai last month.

The four-year-old filly earned owners Jane Mairs and son Tom almost £20,000 when finishing third in the Group 2 Cape Verdi at Meydan on January 19.

Last year's German 1000 Guineas runner-up had every chance at the two-furlong pole but could not withhold the strong finish of Silver Lady and English Rose.

Nevertheless, on her first start since finishing down the

field in a Haydock Listed race in August, Stenton Glider battled on bravely to resist the late challenge of Nibras Angel and earn herself a podium finish.

"Stenton Glider ran super. I was absolutely delighted with her," said Hugo. "What's more, it was her first run in a long time and we hadn't been desperately hard on her going into the race so she should really come forward for the run."

Stenton Glider's next appearance is likely to be in the Group 2 Balanchine on February 23.

Seagulls star is now an owner with MHS

As reported in the previous edition of Manor House Monthly, Nolton Cross set the ball rolling when successful at Southwell just five days into the new year and a second winner of 2024 followed just 35 minutes later when It's Not Risky bagged the very next race at the Nottinghamshire

And the three-year-old son of Modify, who is owned by Derek Horrock's Sustainable Building Services and Michael Owen, followed up when dropped back in trip to take a 1m1½f handicap at Wolverhampton 10 days later. Jason Hart was in the saddle as he had been for the Showcasing

gelding's previous victory.

In between It's Not Risky's two victories, Sweet Talkin Sue and Prince Of Zenda provided MHS with its third and fourth winners of the month.

The former sprang a big surprise under Hayley Turner having been sent off the 66-1 outsider of seven in a 1m1/2f handicap at Wolverhampton on January 14.

Ross Coakley was aboard Prince Of Zenda when the Middleham Park Racing four-yearold took a 6f Lingfield handicap the following day, and the fouryear-old son of Kingman made it back-to-back victories when sluicing up in another 6f handicap, this time at Newcastle, on January 27. On this occasion, 5lb claimer Brandon Wilkie was in

Ross was also aboard for the yard's seventh success of the month, which came courtesy of Havanarama, in a 7f Kempton handicap on January 17. It was a first victory, at the fifth attempt, for the Havana Grey gelding who is owned by Tony Ford and Michael Owen

And six days later, Harry Davies bagged his first winner for MHS this year when partnering the three-year-old Swordstick to victory for owners More Turf Racing on his racecourse debut in a 1m maiden at Southwell.

HE Manor House Stables trip to the legendary Coolmore Stud in County Tipperary, Ireland, was given a ringing endorsement by all those who attended.

Hugo, Michael Owen, and 10 others, including former footballers Steve McManaman and Owen Hargreaves, visited what is widely renowned as the world's biggest, and best, thoroughbred racehorse breeding operation at the end of last month.
