MHS's fine start to the year continues

ANOR House Stables' fine start to the year continued into February with Hugo sending out a further four winners to take the yard's total for 2024 on to 13 [since when it has moved onto 151.

How Impressive was responsible for two of those four wins, taking a 7f handicap at Lingfield on February 5 and following up over the same distance at Kempton nine days later.

Oisin Murphy was aboard on the first occasion, as Middleham Park's fiveyear-old gelding led all the way to provide the former champion jockey with his first domestic winner of the year.

However, up-and-coming 3lb claimer

Brandon Wilkie was entrusted with the ride when the son of Starspangledbanner bagged a fourth career victory at Kempton little more than a week later.

The yard's third winner of the month came courtesy of Kitteridge, who took a 1m2f maiden at Newcastle on February

22. Chasemore Farm's homebred daughter of Camelot was building on a promising debut at Chelmsford the previous month, when she finished second to hot favourite Ville Natale, to score in some style for jockey Jason Hart.

It was another of Middleham Park's charges, Siobhanbrogan, who provided the yard with its final winner of the month when landing a 6f fillies' novice stakes at Wolverhampton on February 26. Having been beaten just a head when finishing third at Chelmsford earlier in the month, the three-year-old daughter of Starspangledbanner ran on well for Oisin to come home two lengths to the good over her closest pursuer.

Hugo keen to repeat Trick

HUGO is intent on defending the Ballyhane Stakes crown that Golden Trick claimed at Naas in August.

The Bronte Collection's two-year-old won the fourth running of the valuable sales race and Hugo has his eyes on the €300K pot again this year.

"We plan to make a large number of entries and are going to do our very best to defend Golden Trick's crown," said Hugo.

"We want to keep the trophy and will be entering as many as we can for this year's very exciting edition of the race."

 The EBF Ballyhane Stakes is a median auction race for two-year-olds that are EBF eligible and whose sire established one or more yearling sales last year with a median price of not more than €75,000.

Both horses performed with credit during the three-month event, which pits internationally trained runners against local Bahrain-trained horses.

The Running Order Partnership's Box To Box was placed on three of his four starts, winning

While it took Roman Dragon a

little longer to adapt to his new surroundings, he came good with a vengeance in his last two appearances. The five-year-old sprinter, who is owned by Nick Hughes and Michael Owen, bagged more than £37,000 when winning a 6f handicap at the beginning of February and picked up another 6k when finishing third a fortnight later.

Jason Hart was doing the steering as Cast No Shadow came home unchallenged in a 5f novice stakes on the Tapeta at Gos-

Sent on from the opening of the stalls, Cast No Shadow was clear at the 2f pole and only had to be pushed out to come home three and a quarter lengths ahead of the nearest of his four

'He's won very well. I've pushed him out but that was

more just to get him to go and do it," reflected Jason in the winner's enclosure after the race.

"He's extended well, run through the line strong and the cheekpieces felt like they did have an effect - when I gave him a squeeze to actually go and start quickening up, he felt like he quickened really well."

Aside from owning Cast No Shadow, Coral have been yard sponsors at Manor House Stables since June of last year.

IDDLEHAM Park Racing has enjoyed an extraordinary start to 2024 with the four horses it has at Manor House Stables carrying all before them.

With the year little more than two months old, the Middleham Park quartet - comprising How Impressive, Prince Of Zenda, Nolton Cross, and Siobhanbrogan - have already won no less than six races.

The same four horses fared pretty well in 2023 when they won five races between them. However, they look set to improve markedly on that total this time around.

The four-year-old gelding Prince of Zenda has led the way, with two victories in two starts. Dropped back in trip to six furlongs, he edged out favourite Habboba to win a Lingfield handicap on January 14.

And he was ultra impressive when beating The Caltonian, who has himself won three races since the end of December, when scoring at Newcastle a fortnight later.

How Impressive has also won twice in 2024, and was narrowly denied a hat-trick when chinned on the line in a 6f handicap at Chelmsford on February 15. Prior to that the five-year-old gelding had won a 7f apprentice handicap at Kempton just 24 hours earlier, nine days after scoring over

the same trip at Lingfield.

Meanwhile, the five-year-old gelding Nolton Cross and threeyear-old filly Siobhanbrogan have each scored once from two starts this year.

The former provided MHS with its first winner of 2024

when successful in a 1m4f Southwell handicap on January 5, while the latter was winning for the first time, on just her third start, when successful in a 6f fillies' novice handicap at Wolverhampton at the end of last

I'd like to think we'll be well represented across the two fixtures, with horses such as Balon D'Or, How Impressive, Nolton Cross, and Price Of Zenda all possible runners, and if we could bag a winner or two that would only cement our good start to the season.

IT was great to get off the mark for the Coral Racing Club courtesy of Cast No Shadows's victory at Newcastle earlier in the month.

We're proud to have Coral as yard sponsors; what is more, everyone I've met from their racing club has been great fun, so I was delighted we were able to reward their support with a winner.

Granted just a little more good fortune, Cast No Shadow might have broken his maiden some time ago, having gone down by a short head at Newcastle back in November and, again, on his penultimate run at Southwell at the beginning of February.
