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MHS bags double at Craven meeting

DOUBLE at Newmarket's Craven meeting was the highlight of another fruitful month for Manor House Stables in April.

Watcha Matey set the ball rolling when pulling off a 33-1 shock in the 1m JRA Handicap on the first day of the three-day fixture, before It Ain't Two defied odds of 16-1 to score on her race-course debut in a maiden fillies' stakes 24 hours later.

Watcha Matey was winning at HQ for the second time, having landed a 7f novice stakes over the July course back in August. On this occasion, Jason Hart was in the saddle as the three-year-old gelding, who is owned by Messrs

Austin, Moran, Rowlands, and McCallum, was sent on a quarter of a mile from home and stayed on well to score convincingly, with two and a quarter lengths back to the closest of his 12 pursuers, The Camden Colt.

The son of Land Force, who has won

two of his eight starts and been placed on four further occasions, has now amassed more than £20,000 in prize money.

A daughter of Calyx, It Ain't Too was successful in the yellow and blue silks of her owner-breeder Michael Owen and Ms Diamond.

Despite becoming a little unbalanced in the dip, Ross Coakley's mount showed a likeable attitude, keeping on well in the final half furlong to repel the two-pronged challenge of Amestris and Magic Mild.

It Ain't Two bagged a first prize of more than £12,000 for seeing off her 12 rivals in the 5f contest.

Al Asayl colt is close fifth

UNDER The Sun, inset, performed with credit when finishing fifth in the Group 3 bet365 Classic Trial at Sandown last Friday.

Al Asayl Bloodstock's talented three-year-old raced in second, behind the eventual winner Arabian Crown, for the majority of the 1m2f contest, but lost three places inside the final

ter lengths, missing out on some black type by less than a length.

Another of Al Asayl's flagbearers, L'Astronome, returned to action in a valuable Newbury handicap earlier in the month. Stepped up in trip to 2m½f the son of Frankel ran encouragingly before tiring in the closing stages and could now go for the Ormonde at Chester next week.

Horses continue in excellent form

PRIL brought five more winners for Manor House Stables to take the vard's total for 2024 onto 23 [22 in the UK and one in Bahrain].

Auric provided the yard with its first winner of the month when scoring in a 6f novice stakes at Kempton on April 6.

Having made an encouraging debut when finishing fourth at Wolverhampton in March, the Havana Gold three-year-old prevailed by a head under Oisin

The victory netted more than £10,000 for owners Manor House Stables Syndicate II, whose coffers received a further boost when Auric finished second in a 6f contest at Windsor on

While Auric was forced to dig deep to win at Kempton. Grey

Cuban's victory at Wolverhampton seven days later was altogether more emphatic.

Hollie Doyle bounced the grey gelding out of the stalls and he went clear two furlongs out to come home eight lengths to the good over runner-up Local Hero.

While it was a first victory, at the sixth attempt, for Grey Cuban, the son of Havana Grey wasn't winning out of turn, having been placed on three of his five starts as a juvenile.

As detailed on Page One, the

yard's third and fourth winners of the month came courtesy of victories for Watcha Matey and It Ain't Two at Newmarket's Craven meeting.

And the yard bagged its fifth winner of another productive month when Havanarama returned to winning ways in a 1m1/2f handicap at Wolverhampton on Saturday evening.

Oisin was in the saddle as the bay gelding, who is owned by Michael Owen and Tony Ford, bagged his second victory since the turn of the year.

Sent off the 2-1 favourite, Havanarama was always well positioned and kept on well inside the final furlong to see off Twirler by half a length.

Another son of Havana Grey, Havanarama has now earned almost 15k in 2024.

XCITEMENT is mounting ahead of one of the biggest weeks of the year in the MHS calendar.

The Boodles May Festival gets under way at Chester next Wednesday [May 8] and Hugo expects the yard to be well represented on all three days.

"As things stand, we could have runners in pretty much everything except, perhaps, the two Classic trials and the Chester Cup consolation race," said Hugo.

"I guess our No. 1 hope for the week has to be Zoffee in the big race next Friday. He finished second in last year's Chester Cup, when he was beaten just a neck, and runs off a 3lbs lower mark this time around.

"Truth be told, it was a struggle even to get him to the race last year. However, I couldn't be more happy with him right now. Assuming he makes the cut, I'd like to think he could go very, very close"

Hugo will also be looking to five-times course-winner Roman Dragon and Box To Box, who has won four races at Chester, to put in big performances.

One horse who is unlikely to be seen on the Roodee next week is recent Newmarket scorer It Ain't Two.

"She's only small and would have to shoulder a 5lbs penalty in the Lily Agnes so I think it's altogether more likely we'll wait

for the Marygate at York the following week," said Hugo.

In the meantime, Hugo will be keeping his fingers crossed that it stays relatively dry and the meeting doesn't take place on

the desperate ground that prevailed last year. In addition, with track position oh so important at Chester, he'll be hoping Manor House's runners are blessed with some decent draws!

Strike rate in excess of 20 per cent must be a cause for cheer

T goes without saying, strike rate isn't everything – far from it. Nevertheless, the fact remains that almost one in four of the horses MHS has sent to the races thus far in 2024 has been successful [21 winners from 92 runners, as of the end of April] and that must be a cause for cheer

All said and done, how many winners we have at the end of the year is what will define our season. At the same time, I think it's fair to say that a strike rate of almost 23 per cent, having sent out close to 100 runners, has to be extremely pleasing.

Sadly, it's nigh on inevitable that at some point over the next eight months that strike rate will slip a little. Be that as it may, we've made a fantastic start to the campaign and given ourselves some extremely solid foundations on which to build.

With 60-odd two-year-olds in the yard this year, the juveniles will play a big part in determining our fortunes, so I hope I'm right in thinking they're the nicest group of youngsters



we've had for some time. And while we'd have less fast, five-furlong types, who are ready early, than we've had in previous years, I'd like to think we've got some really nice young horses to look forward to later on in the year.

E were delighted to have two winners at Newmarket's Craven meeting last month; while the yard has been going well for some time now, it's always good to get on the scoresheet at bigger meetings such as this.

Moreover, It Ain't Two's victory in a valuable maiden fillies' stakes wasn't really expected. She'd been going okay at home, but we've plenty of two-year-olds who've been showing

Conversely, while Watcha Matey was sent

off at 33-1, we've always thought a lot of him and, while he got a great ride from Jason Hart, he won decisively and I don't think there was any fluke about it.

Certainly, if you'd told me at the beginning of last year that come the end of the season he would have won one race and be rated 79 I would have been disappointed. Touch wood, he can kick on from here with the Britannia Stakes at Royal Ascot a possible target.

HILE I've been a vocal critic of a few of the initiatives the BHA have undertaken over recent years, their HorsePWR campaign, inset, has my full support.

Designed to heighten knowledge of the industry, HorsePWR's digital hub, which can be found here, is packed with facts about the sport and, in particular, the high welfare and safety standards that underpin British racing.

All sports involving animals depend on a social licence and, with that in mind, it seems to me that his is just what racing needs. Its equine participants enjoy a life of luxury, in which they want for nothing, and it's imperative we heighten awareness of this amongst the public at large. Of course, there will still be one or two who take issue with the sport but initiatives such as HorsePWR can go a long way to ensuring they remain in the minority.

What, in your opinion, sets Manor House apart from other yards? The gallops are exceptional and the welfare of the horses is second to none.


Sum yourself up in five words. Caring, level-headed, sociable, thoughtful winner.
